- Race: 77% of Stable Families' heads of household are Black or African American, compared to 30% of Gladden Prevention's heads of household. This difference was statistically significant.
- **Gender:** 94% of Stable Families' heads of household are female, compared to 78% of Gladden Prevention's heads of household. This difference was statistically significant.
- Family size (average): The average number of people in the families served by Stable Families (3.8) was larger than the average number of people in the families served by Gladden's Prevention program (2.5).¹
