System Indicator Report



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Overview

System and Program Indicator Reports are published quarterly and furnished to CSB trustees and the Continuum of Care. All reports are posted to www.csb.org. Results are also shared with CSB funders consistent with funding contracts and agreements.

The System and Program Indicator Report monitors the current CSB funded programs and some non-CSB funded programs that participate in our data system. The report evaluates each system and program based on a system or program goal, actual performance data, variances, and outcome achievements. Outcome achievement is defined as 90% or better of numerical goal or within 5 percentage points of a percentage goal, except where a lesser or greater value than this variance also indicates an achieved goal. Systems or programs which meet less than one-half of outcome goals are considered to be a "program of concern". The following key is used to express outcome achievement status for each indicator:


System-level race and gender-based outcome disparities are included in the report. A disparity is defined as a demographic achieving a successful exit that is at least five percentage points less than the respective percentage of the demographic population served in each system.

All data generated from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and used in the report met CSB quality assurance standards, which require current and accurate data and a 95% completion rate for all required HMIS data variables.


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

When compared to the same period of the prior fiscal year 8% less households needed shelter. The success rate at exit from shelters increased 2 percentage points to 35%. The average length of shelter stay increased by 21 days to 99 days, the highest level recorded historically. While the number of families served decreased, the family system is reporting the highest average nightly occupancy at 165 families. Lack of available safe, decent, affordable housing is making it difficult to successfully out of shelter quickly. The employment rate at entry increased from the FY23 annual rate of 27% to 32% currently and the average income increased to \$861 (FY23 \$652). 4% of families (12) had more than one shelter stay during the timeframe. The number of pregnant women served increased by 12% (3) compared to the same reporting period in FY23 (26). An additional 80 families stayed in the Overnight shelter program only, waiting for a face-to-face shelter eligibility assessment. These families were subsequently either helped to find an alternative to shelter or self-resolved.



The number of single men sheltered decreased 10% when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The success rate at exit from shelters increased 3 percentage points to 18%. The average length of time homeless increased by 16 days to 78 days, the highest level recorded historically. Lack of available safe, decent, affordable housing is making it difficult to successfully move individuals out of shelter quickly. The employment rate at entry increased 3 percentage points to 23% when compared to the FY23 annual rate of 20%, and the average income increased to \$675 (FY23 \$592). 26% of men (284) had multiple stays in shelter during the timeframe. The rate of adults aged 62+ increased by 5 percentage point to 17% when compared to the annual FY23 rate (12%). The number of veterans served increased by 38 (36%), compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year (FY23 105). The rate of Franklin County residents served increased by 6 percentage points.



The number of single women sheltered increased 6% when compared to the same reporting period of the previous year. The success rate at exit increased 5 percentage points to 21%. The average length of time homeless increased by 16 days to the highest level recorded historically. Lack of available safe, decent, affordable housing is making it difficult to successfully move individuals out of shelter quickly. The employment rate at entry decreased by 1 percentage point to 19% when compared to the FY23 annual rate of 20%, and the average income increased to \$675 (FY23 \$618). 18% of women (99) had multiple stays in shelter during the timeframe. The number of pregnant women served decreased by 9% (3) compared to the same reporting period in FY23 (35). The rate of adults aged 62+ increased by 4 percentage points to 14% when compared to the annual FY23 rate (10%).

The number served by the system decreased 6% when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year impacted by the significant increase in the length of shelter stay. The successful housing outcome rate increased 3 percentage points to 21%. The average length of time homeless increased by 17 days to 82 days, the highest level recorded historically. The average income increased to \$709 when compared to the FY23 annual rate of \$589. The system served 29 more (25% increase) veterans and 1 less (2% decrease) pregnant women when compared to the same reporting period of the previous year (118, 62). The rate of Franklin County residents served increased by 5 percentage points.

The number of households served increased 3% when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year and the number of new households served increased by 15%. The successful housing
outcome rate decreased by 6 percentage points to 86% and the average length of participation in the program significantly decreased to 100 days. At exit, 52% of households are stable in their own housing
and 34% decided to permanently move in with family/friends. The percent working at entry increased compared to the FY23 annual rate of 44% to 46% currently. The number of veterans served increased by
20 (36% increase) and the number of pregnant women served decreased by 15 (22%) when compared to same reporting period of FY23 (56, 69). Compared to FY2023, this quarter marked the termination of
the Homelessness Prevention For Pregnant Women program, which explains the decrease in pregnant women served, SHO number and ALOP number.




Q4 Households Served (#)

The number served decreased 10% when compared to the same reporting period of the previous year, significantly impacted by a 15 day average increase in length of participation by families (FY23 217). Rapid Re-housing providers are reporting continued difficulty securing low-income, affordable housing. CSB believes there are multiple factors impacting the system, including the impact of the Colonial Village project, 270 households exited hotels during this timeframe and finding appropriately sized housing units to fit the needs of the households served. The success rate at exit decreased 3 percentage points to 59 percent and the length of participation decreased by 11 days. The self-reported disability rate increased to 48% (FY23 annual rate 47%) for families and decreased to 70% (FY23 78%) for single adults. The number of veterans served decreased by 4% (9) and the number of pregnant women increased by 1 (3% increase) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year (228, 36).

The system-wide number of families served remained flat (FY23 1,245) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The number of families receiving homelessness prevention services remained flat (FY23 422). The rate of families in emergency shelter decreased by 9% (FY23 335) and in rapid re-housing by 25% (FY23 380) during the same timeframe. The number of families in permanent supportive housing increased by 19% (FY23 316). The length of time families spent in emergency shelter increased significantly, when compared to FY23 (78). The rate of Black/African American families and women-headed families served system-wide is substantially disproportionate compared to the Franklin County population in poverty. From an outcomes perspective, the homelessness system has no substantial impact on these families.





The system-wide number of single adults served decreased by 2% (FY23 4,634) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The number of single adults in emergency shelter decreased by 5% (FY23 1,741) and those in rapid rehousing decreased by 3% (FY23 710). The number of single adults unsheltered increased by 22% (FY23 274) and those in Homelessness Prevention increased by 14% (FY23 113). The number in permanent supportive housing decreased by 4% (FY23 2,299). The rate of Black/African American single adults served system-wide is substantially disproportionate compared to the Franklin County population and to the Franklin County population in poverty. From an outcomes perspective, the homelessness system has no substantial impact on these single adults.





The system-wide number of pregnant women served remained flat (FY23 150) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The number of pregnant women served by homelessness prevention projects decreased by 2% (FY23 69). The number served by emergency shelters increased by 2% (FY23 62) and rapid re-housing increased by 3% (FY23 36) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The number of pregnant women unsheltered remained flat (FY23 3). The successful housing exit rate of pregnant women served in rapid re-housing significantly decreased from 86% in FY23 to 25% currently. The rate of Black/African American women served system-wide is substantially disproportionate compared to the Franklin County population and to the Franklin County population in poverty. Also, the rate of BIPOC pregnant women in homelessness prevention, permanent supportive housing, and rapid re-housing programs exceeds 80% of the population served in the respective program types. From an outcomes perspective, the homelessness system has no substantial impact on these pregnant women.





The system-wide number of veterans served decreased by 3% when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year (FY23 885) impacted by the decrease in number served in permanent supportive housing. The number of veterans receiving homelessness prevention services increased by 36% (FY23 56), the number of veterans in emergency shelters increased by 25% (FY23 118). The VOA GPD Transitional Housing program closed as of 9/30/23, decreasing the capacity of veterans programming by 40 beds. The number of veterans served in rapid re-housing decreased by 4% (FY23 228) and the number in permanent supportive housing decreased by 6% (FY23 573) when compared to the prior fiscal year. The rate of Black/African American veterans served system-wide is substantially disproportionate compared to the Franklin County veteran population. From an outcomes perspective, the homelessness system has no substantial impact on these veterans.





The number of transition age youth served increased 3% (FY23 658) when compared to the same reporting period of the prior fiscal year. The number of youth served by homelessness prevention decreased 38% (FY23 135), by permanent supportive housing increased 19% (FY23 124), by rapid re-housing increased 9% (FY23 205), and by street outreach increased 108% (FY23 12). The number of youth served in emergency shelters increased 13% (FY23 200) and in transitional housing decreased 11% (FY23 72). The number of pregnant youth served system-wide decreased by 5% (FY23 57). The rate of Black/African American youth and female youth served system-wide is substantially disproportionate compared to the Franklin County population in poverty. F rom an outcomes perspective, the homelessness system has no substantial impact on these youth. In addition, the high rate of homeless Black/African American underage and young adult girls shows a system failure that must be addressed with urgency.

Community Shelter Board leads a coordinated, community effort to make sure everyone has a place to call home in Columbus and Franklin County, Ohio.

CSB was founded in 1986 on the vision that no one should be homeless in our community, for even one night. As the system leader for the prevention of and response to homelessness in Central Ohio, CSB funds and coordinates care across 17 partner agencies providing outreach, homelessness prevention, emergency shelter, and housing programs to help low-income families and single adults facing homelessness in Franklin County regain housing stability. Over the past 10 years alone, CSB's system of care has housed more than 35,000 people.

CSB is funded by the City of Columbus, the Franklin County Board of Commissioners, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the State of Ohio, United Way of Central Ohio, The Columbus Foundation, Nationwide Foundation, American Electric Power Foundation, and many other public and private investors.
